Mrs. Dillon has a Class of Bucket Fillers?

Something that I consider "great" in my classroom is the practice of bucket filling. Bucket filling is basically a new twist on the Golden Rule. We start the year by reading the book: *Have You Filled a Bucket Today?* We put the book into practice all year long. The book explains to children that we all carry an invisible bucket in which we keep our feelings about ourselves. When our buckets are full, we are happy; when they are empty, we are sad. It's important to know that we can fill our own bucket and so can others. We can also dip into it.

The simple metaphor of a bucket helps even Kindergarten children understand the importance of consideration and love, particularly toward those who bully. We keep an actual bucket in the classroom that the students watch "fill up" (with all their good actions.) It definitely keeps the focus on all the positive things they do.

In addition to implementing these ideas in the classroom, I have also tried to make a home/school connection with each family by sharing the book with each of them. Each family participated by reading the book at home with their child and also completed an entry in our bucket filler journal.

Miss Kelley's 1st Grade Olympians

The First Grade recently finished a three week Social Studies unit focused on the Winter Olympics. We used our Reading, Writing, Math, and map skills as we learned about the Olympic rings that represent the continents, discussed the "journey" of the Olympic torch and the lighting of the Olympic flame as a symbol of peace between the competing nations, learned the Olympic motto, identified a few of our favorite winter sports and athletes, and kept track of the medal count. Students took home their own completed "My Olympics Book-Winter 2010" just before the weekend of the closing ceremony. As we learned about the ceremonies and competitions, the students learned to appreciate and respect the incredible talent and dedication of each of the individual athletes. The thing that excites me about my class is that they "catch the fever" of whatever new things we are learning about. We have an excellent reading series that crosses over into social studies and science quite frequently. Whenever we expand on the topic, the students run with it. We just finished a story on Helen Keller. They brought in every book they could find on Helen Keller and I read many of them to the class. I promised them that we would see *The Miracle Worker* someday. The students thirst for knowledge. We are now studying fossils and dinosaurs, which is a popular topic with second graders, but they seem to go beyond that. Children naturally want to please their teachers, but they continue to amaze me with their degree of interest. I feel like I can't keep up with them and want them to learn more and more.

3rd grade students were asked to bring in their favorite stuffed animal. The assignment that correlates with this is to write a paragraph using as many adjectives as they could to describe their furry friend. The descriptive paragraphs were checked and the students read their report to the class while another student held up the stuffed animal. The 3rd grade is also enjoying fun math games. Students paired up with a partner to play a multiplication game which involved rolling dice and figuring out the product of the numbers on the dice. They had to record their answers on a worksheet which had rows of numbers. The student who filled in all of the squares first, won the game.



Have you ever written an autobiography? The 3rd grades have just finished theirs. Mrs. Bierut began the lesson by reading them her autobiography which contained her baby pictures. The students wrote their own after finding out where they were born and how much they weighed. They had to draw themselves as a baby and how they look now. They designed a cover and the pages were bound into a booklet for them. They then read them to the class.

He enjoys reading now; at the beginning of the year, he could not find anything he wanted to read.
